

Britain to the roundabout rescue. In 1966 the British experimented with a rule that required vehicles entering a circular intersection to yield to those already in it. Capacity increased by 10 percent, and delays and crashes both decreased by 40 percent. It was a huge success, and the country soon implemented the rule nationwide. The modern roundabout was born



Over the next few decades, the British concept spread throughout the world, though some countries proved more skeptical than others. The United States, which had actively removed many of their old rotaries, was particularly resistant: A proposed three-leg roundabout in Ojai, California, would have been the country's first had it not been scrapped due to public outcry in 1988. It would be another two years before the United States got its first modern roundabout, when engineers constructed two in the planned community of Summerlin, Nevada. Despite some persistent American skepticism, the concept continued to gain traction, and by 2014 the country boasted 10,341 roundabouts

Pasta Carbonara

400g egg tagliatelle 1 cup parmesan, finely grated (to serve) 1 large brown onion, finely chopped 1/3 cup continental parsley, chopped 300ml pure cream 2 tbs olive oil 3 eggs 3 garlic cloves, crushed 250g pancetta, cut into strips



Cook pasta following packet directions until al dente. Drain well. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large frying pan over medium heat. Add pancetta and onion. Cook for 8 minutes or until pancetta is golden. Add the garlic and cook for a further 2 minutes. Whisk cream and eggs in a bowl. Stir in parmesan and season with salt and pepper. Add pancetta mixture and cream mixture to hot pasta and toss to combine. Stir through parsley and serve immediately sprinkled with extra parmesan.



Fun with English Cars

Anthony is a young fellow that I met when he was an apprentice working on English cars. He now works for himself. I ring him when I run out of talent, time or the inclination to solve an issue with our 1996 Jaguar XJR.

Last Sunday we decided to wake the car from "under the sheets" and head out for lunch and a drive. That plan fell in a heap when horrible noises emanated from the fan/drive belts at the front of the engine. While age and arthritis are gradually diminishing the projects I will now tackle, there was simply no way I was going to ring Anthony to fix a simple fan belt noise!

We love our Jaguars for all sorts of reasons. Space, grace and pace is the motto. The first of these variables is an outright fallacy. I just spent two days under the XJR to solve the malady with whichever of its 3 belts was the issue

On our model there is a clearance of only 100mm from the ground before things get in the way. It's not just a case of wriggling under, even with your cheek on the concrete you don't get headroom. One needs to get really sneaky and drive onto a pair of those ABS racing ramps which gives you another 40mm. That's just enough to get the trolley jack in and under the front coil spring seat. Do it twice, slide the stands under the jacking point below the front doors and you are done. "So why didn't he use the front cross member", I hear you mutter. No, that part of the suspension is apparently only there to hold the wheels apart. Thou shall not sully the member with your silly hydraulic apparatus notes the workshop manual. Distortion will apparently occur, necessitating the removal of the engine to enable replacement. I kid you not, there is a sticker (not 26 years old) on our cross member, which makes me think that somebody has been down this path before and paid the (no doubt considerable) price.

Two of the belts have idler wheel adjusters that, at first glance, look like a 10mm Allen key, except that they have 4 sides...of course they do. A call to my mate Bill to "make a tool please", fixed the issue and added to the long list of favours I may sadly never finish repaying.

The third belt, which drives the supercharger; has a tensioning system that is hidden under the alternator. It looks as though it had a previous life as a bicycle chain adjuster. Access, I reasoned, would be best accomplished with the radiator, air conditioning condenser and intercooler removed. That wasn't going to happen, but marked a point at which I needed a break and a beer.

Monday morning saw me standing on a brick, to get me just a bit higher to actually see the adjuster. With a wriggle, I could get my hand past an obstructing coolant hose, and reach the target. Mecca!

The rest was a doddle. Change the belts and a tension wheel, that I wager didn't come in a green and white box; and life was good again.

I might not tell Anthony this story for reasons of foolish pride. May you never meet him and compromise my deceit.
