President's Run:

Old Petrie Town 02 June 2024 Letting off steam

When I was young, barely of drinking age, my friend used to refer to cheap wine (chateau collapsible) as 'steam'. I was never sure why, but there is a passing relevance to start my account of the second day of both June and Winter. On this day Chaccers took on the challenge proposed by Kim's run sheet, to travel all the way to the distant hamlet of Petrie. There were times when the task seemed too difficult, but that we persevered, and by following Kim's tyre tracks left during his and Carol's reconnoitre, we finally sighted a battered signpost, only just standing, which advised that our destination was over the next hill. As we drew closer and slowed for a guard outside the property walls, to check our papers, we noted vehicles







scattered along the edges of the track. My navigator and I, surmised that extensive mechanical damage from the journey, probably caused their abandonment by owners long ago. Once inside the property, high on a hill, it was clearly evident that there was some kind of festival underway. More guards with red flags, prescribed our route, each seeming to be wearing a different uniform to the preceding official. All had red flags and used semaphore to message ahead. Although proficient in the code, I was unable to decipher the signals. Our vehicles had been allocated places along a track close to the Tavern, where we were instructed to park "nose out", presumably to exit quickly should a need arise. I did enquire from one of the guards, if they were expecting any incursion from warring factions. He was impassively silent, probably for security reasons and sent more code with his flag,

again undecipherable.

I love old machinery and if there are wheels, it's all the better. The atmosphere here was all about challenging your senses. There where whistles, loud and long. Smells that spoke to your nostrils about heat and history. Present also were rhythmical clanking sounds, which were not familiar to our individual databases of modern experiences. Childlike exuberance, hastened our unpacking of seating into a nearby rotunda, which we chanced was available. Using the dictum of "it's easier to ask forgiveness than to get permission first", we dumped our chairs and headed to where everybody else seemed to be going. In a group we walked towards the mechanical clatter. Today was about power before petrol. On that theme there was a representation of about 20 small "stationary" engines, with boilers mostly heated by butane burners. Their owners fussing over the apparatuses' needs for fuel and lubrication, like parents of their first born. The antique mechanicals of these 2 metre square devises and their accourtements, make discordant coughing noises when exhaling, thus giving reason for their descriptor which is "hit and miss" motors. They were used to power everything from irrigation pumps to shearing sheds up until the 1930s.

The big news about today's activities though was the steam powered tractors. There is a well fenced track, the width of a suburban roadway, devoted to the pathing of these huge iron-treaded monsters. They are really the 'part and parcel' of the business end of a steam train. With a fire, coal and boilers providing life to the sliding cylinders, those huge rear wheels, sans tyres, are coerced into circular motion to make forward progress. The vision of these purveyors of the past, are proceeded by their noise, smell and smoke, to made a total experience that stopped anybody with a shred of mechanical interest in their body. On venturing closer, there was another surprise, which was the humidity generated by the vapours escaping from this marvellously



synchronized collection of rods, levers, belts and chains. I do so love this style of the naked display, where all the workings of a contrivance are on view, which allows your mind to follow every movement, to its final output, thus providing a delightful satisfaction, in your understanding of its rationale for existence.

The day was not yet done, although the incessant interruption, to the air of authenticity, by the discordant bell atop the miniature fire engines, read golf-carts, on in their journeys in the generation of passenger income, needed perseverance and coffee in equal quantities to fuel vintage passion.

Moving down to the workshops and sheds was a journey rewarded with the acquaintance of some beautifully restored 1920ish vehicles. One that caught my eye and transfixed my being was, I think, a 1928 Chevrolet coupe. It was complete with rumble seat in the rear, to carry one's mother in law, according to rumour. It was magnificence personified, in dark green bodywork, offset perfectly by its black spoked wheels.

Satisfied by my experiences, but sad to leave, I strolled past ladies, dancing in a circle with the accompaniment of a piano accordion, back to our starting point. Two very small and old, vintage, cars, again perhaps 1920s, with cloth roofs, joined our waiting vehicles. One was an Austin Chummy7, with its tiny capacity of 696 cc, producing horsepower appropriate to its title. The other was a Morris Cowley perhaps, I didn't get confirmation from the owner. Both cars had the cute factor absolutely nailed.










Easy Banana Muffins


